# LITTLE FLOWER SPOTLIGHT ON TOM COSTELLO

This issue's "Little Flower Spotlight" is on Tom Costello.

Little Flower Garden News (LFGN): You've been in LF your entire life. What are some of the highlights of your time here?

Tom Costello (TC): As might be expected, most of those highlights are in the later years of my time here. Although I attended Little Flower School, most memories of that time have faded. Our three boys all attended Little Flower. My attendance on the eighth grade trip to Washington D.C. began when I attended with them when they were in eighth grade. It then continued when I began working here as I began coordinating

the trip. I believe I attended that trip some 20 times, and all of them were great experiences. Most of my highlights came during my time of full-time employment from 2000 until 2017 and included accomplishments that included the formation of the parish youth choir, Debt Free in 2003, the replacement of all of the crumbling brick facade of the church building, the facilitation of the capital campaign that resulted in air-conditioning in the school, and my appointment as parish music director in 2017 as my full-time employment came to a close. As much as these large accomplishments are more often recognized as significant, I have worked with so many parishioner volunteers and accomplished so many things much smaller in scope, but, nonetheless, these are highlights for me as well.

*LFGN: How did you decide to apply to be the parish administrator back in 1999?* 

TC: In 1994 I ended a 23-year career as a pharmacist with Hook Drugs when they were sold to Revco. I then became National Director of Customer Support for Medi-Span, a pharmaceutical information database company, until that company was sold in 1999. During 1999 I worked for Bindley Western Drug Company, but was tiring of the uncertainty of the corporate rat race. I was reading a book called *Halftime: Moving from Success to Significance* that addressed career changes in mid-life. I would often read that book in the overnight hours of Friday during an adoration time in the chapel. I decided I wanted to work in a job where I could have more impact on people. Having been an active volunteer here at Little Flower, my next step seemed obvious.

*LFGN: What did you enjoy most about the administrative job? Least?* 

TC: I have loved the variation that came with every day, and the opportunity to learn new skills and have so many varied experiences. I loved having some impact on the community where I had been formed since birth. I loved (at least for the most part) working with so many parish volunteers to accomplish some really remarkable things. And I have enjoyed the generosity of Little Flower parishioners, who made so many things possible. There is truly not a lot that I did not enjoy, although many would say that I worked too much during those years. And especially in the later years I tended to tire more easily of meetings!

LFGN: What was the impetus for taking on the music ministry?

TC: My involvement in music ministry became very significant in my faith life. I joined Christmas Choir sometime in the early to mid 1980s, and in the next few years joined the adult choir, became a cantor and became one of the accompanists for the choir. Teresa Eckrich was a very significant person in my musical and faith journey. I had a deep appreciation and affection for, and investment in, the program she had built. (continued on page 2)

#### SPOTLIGHT ON TOM COSTELLO

TC: During the final year of her illness, we were having difficulties searching for a replacement. At the same time, I was approaching age 65 and I had decided to retire from full-time employment. I certainly had not accumulated great wealth during my time working for the church, so I knew I would need to find some part -time work in retirement. Again, my next step became obvious. During all my transitions, I always felt that if I was seeking out God's plan, it became obvious to me.

LFGN: You once mentioned youth choir as something you particularly loved. What were the best things about it?

TC: I began youth choir in 1995. During those years I have had the blessing to work with many kids. Middle school and high school kids were the groups I had the most opportunity to work with. I really love that age, and that is exactly who was involved with youth choir. Although there were some frustrations along the way, these teens have been very life-giving to me. Their energy helped keep me energized. Their acceptance of me has also been life-giving to me. I can't tell you how many times I would have rather done anything than come back for yet another weekend Mass on Sunday evening. But without fail, when I got here and started preparing with the kids, it was always a positive experience in the The energy and vitality of these kids was also the reason I enjoyed coordinating confirmation, facilitating youth room, and going on annual Washington D.C., King's Island, and snow-tubing trips.

LFGN: If you could change one thing about our faith, what would it be and why? TC: I am going to address this question from the perspective of what I would change about the church, not the faith. Although there are teachings of the church that I don't necessarily agree with, I also know that these are not things that are likely to change in the short term. The biggest thing I would change is how the church chooses to live those teachings. I believe the church is sometimes guilty of not practicing what it preaches. I don't think we (the church) always demonstrate Jesus' Gospel of love and acceptance. I don't think the church is evolving quickly enough to make sure all people feel welcome, accepted, and loved....and sometimes our official actions demonstrate quite the opposite. Again, I am not talking about changing the teachings, but changing how we respond to those teachings. In addition, I wish the church (both locally and globally) were more innovative and progressive in ways to solve the clergy shortage. Whether that is changing who can be ordained, or developing innovative staffing models that allow a bigger role for lay vocations in the church, we are already many years late in taking some decisive actions. Finally, I wish the church would be more proactive in protecting the universality of the church and its liturgy. In my experience you could go to church anyplace and expect your experience to be much the same. Now, even in our own archdiocese, the liturgy is often celebrated differently by different presiders. I believe the archdiocese needs to get a handle on this. It is important for me to note that these are my personal opinions, and in no way represent the opinion of parish leadership or any staff person. But I think there are always things we would change in organizations that we are a part of, and church is no exception.

LFGN: What will you be doing going forward?

TC: The jury is still out on that one. Mary Martha will completely retire in August of this year. I certainly hope that some traveling is in our future. And we will probably be looking for some other opportunities to stay busy while here at home. However, we need to find my replacement first!

I am certainly grateful for all of my experiences and all of the people who have come into my life as a result of my time at Little Flower.

The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul (SVDP) is an international organization devoted to service to the poor. The local conference has been active for many years and recently revived with new members.

A debt of gratitude is due to the passion and strength of Judy Corpuz and Pat Dunn for keeping the ideals alive through the pandemic and attrition of members. Currently there are ten active members with several volunteers for special projects.

Many people are aware of SVDP as a place to donate clothes via the drop box on campus or taking things to the warehouse downtown.

The most active part of the local conference is responding to calls made to the United Way 211 call hot line. People in need can call 211 and give their information. If the needs fit the scope of SVDP and they are located in the boundaries of Little Flower (the blue area on the map) the call is directed to us. The needs of the "neighbor" are assessed and help is given. Rent and utility aid is potentially given immediately. Physical needs such as furniture and appliances necessitate a home visit. Two members of our conference make a home visit to assess the need. When called for, an itemized list of warehouse goods is generated and sent to the warehouse. The neighbor then makes arrangements to pick up the items free of charge. Large goods are allowed once a year. Clothing is twice a year.

Donations are the lifeblood of SVDP. Clothes and household goods are always welcome. Monetary aid is critical. Special church collection envelopes are set aside for months with 5 Sundays to help. Recently it became possible to contribute via electronic means.

Personal volunteers are always welcome. The conference meets every other week and prayerfully devotes time to the process of aiding our needy neighbors. Special holiday projects like Thanksgiving baskets and the Christmas Giving Trees need SVDP help.

## FIRST EUCHARIST AND RECONCILIATION

Sacramental preparation for First Eucharist and Reconciliation will begin in the fall for children entering 2<sup>nd</sup> grade. Children who attend Little Flower School will prepare during school.

If you have a child who is in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade, attends public schools and needs to be enrolled in our Sacramental Program (article at right), please contact Lisa at 317-357-8352, ext 105, or email:

lgibbons@littleflowerparish.org to register. Classes will begin on Sunday, September 10, from 10:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

If you have a child in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade or above who has not made their First Eucharist, please contact Lisa at 317-357 -8352, ext 105 or lgibbons@littleflowerparish.org as soon as possible.

A requirement for First Eucharist is to be a baptized Catholic. If your son or daughter has not been baptized in the Catholic Faith, please contact the parish center for more information. Generally speaking, at least one parent of a child being presented for Baptism must be Catholic.

## RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AND RCIA NOW ENROLLING

We are currently enrolling for our Religious Education Program for children attending public schools. We offer classes for grades kindergarten through 8<sup>th</sup>. Becoming Catholic Do you have a relative who always asks you about the Catholic Church or a friend who brings up the Church Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults and asks about things like "transubstantiation"? If you know

the answers, that's great, but if you don't know the answers, bring your wondering friend or relative and join others who are interested in knowing more about the Catholic Church at the next session of The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults or RCIA.

RCIA is the process through which interested adults are gradually introduced to the Roman Catholic faith and way of life. Little Flower will begin another RCIA session on Tuesday, September 5, from 7 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. in the Parish Center.

The RCIA is a communal process which explains almost everything about the Catholic Church and answers the questions of potential candidates or catechumens as they move toward the final rite, usually at the Easter Vigil, when they will become full members of the Roman Catholic Church. 
